#### Responses to Questions Raised

#### Discussion of Recent Events in and around the Community

- May 17<sup>th</sup> - Manitouwadge Tech Day (discussed earlier)
- May 24<sup>th</sup> - Dr. Jason Donev school visits – Jason spoke to the barriers in respect to the fuel as a ceramic being a barrier in itself, as non-soluble. Along with the zircaloy tubing, and highly resistant to corrosion-copper coating, and the bentonite clay at depth will prevent microbial growth, plus the 500 metres of solid rock.. Project Coordinator – Reads quote *“It was a pleasure to come back to Hornepayne and this time meet with students. I spent the day talking with students from grade 5 up through grade 12. The students were polite, inquisitive and eager to learn more. Hornepayne has much to be proud of with their youth and their schools and it was a privilege to spend the day with the students.”*
- June 3<sup>rd</sup>-6<sup>th</sup> 38<sup>th</sup> Annual CNS Conference in Saskatoon SK. Well attended with over 200 scientists from all over the world. The purpose is to showcase the advancement of technology and our understanding of nuclear science and radiation. Canada is still considered the most advance program in the world. Small modular reactors (SMR) were a large focus of the conference. Jon spoke to Blair Skinner there, Mayor of Pinawa about how their town functions with Whiteshell Laboratory as part of their town. Pinawa is looking to put a SMR in his community. Jon suggested bringing Mayor Skinner to Hornepayne to share his knowledge and experiences.
